

**South Berwick Town Council  
Public Hearing  
Discontinuance of Emery's Bridge Rd Easement  
February 14, 2012**

Chairman Gerald W. MacPherson, Sr. opened the hearing at 6:30pm. Councilors present included Jean Demetracopoulos, David Burke, David H. Webster, and John C. Kareckas. Town Manager Perry A. Ellsworth was also in attendance.

The purpose of the hearing was to receive public comment on the proposed discontinuance **of a public easement near 535 Emery's Bridge Road, as voted by the Town Council on** October 24, 1979 and recorded at the York County Registry of Deeds Book 2587, Page 246.

Barry & Julie Person and Wendy Rackliff, representing the properties involved, were all present.

Mr. Ellsworth explained that the request for the discontinuance from the Persons may not be sufficient as originally submitted. He is currently working with an attorney from Maine Municipal to determine the proper way to handle the issue. He recommended that the Persons and Rackliffs file a joint petition.

Mrs. Demetracopoulos commented that this should be the only public hearing required and ultimately an extinguishment of the discontinuance would be filed.

Mr. Kareckas received confirmation from Mr. & Mrs. Person and Mrs. Rackliff that they are all in favor of the petition to **discontinue the Town's easement. Mr. Kareckas also stated** that correct language and the applicable authority to make the change should be used to avoid any future problems.

The hearing was closed at 6:47pm.

## **South Berwick Town Council February 14, 2012**

Chairman Gerald W. MacPherson, Sr. called the meeting to order at 6:47pm. Councilors present included, David Burke, Jean Demetracopoulos, David H. Webster, and John C. Kareckas. Town Manager Perry Ellsworth was also in attendance.

### **Approval of Minutes**

1. Council 1-24-12: On a motion by Mr. Webster, seconded by Mrs. Demetracopoulos, it was unanimously voted to adopt the minutes as written.

### **Treasurer's Warrant – Feb 14, 2012**

On a motion by Mr. Kareckas, seconded by Mrs. Demetracopoulos, it was unanimously voted to sign the warrant in the amount of \$706,944.30

### **Public Comment**

No one in the audience wished to speak.

### **Reports & Correspondence**

1. The Town Manager read a letter from Donald Bolstridge. Mr. Bolstridge is asking for a review of the R3 Zone on the Route 91 corridor – letter attached.

### **Town Manager's Report**

-Currently working on plastering, window trim, and wainscoting at the library. The Friends have donated another \$20,000 and Sherwin Williams in Dover is donating 20 gallons of paint. The move should start on February 27<sup>th</sup> at an estimated cost of \$5000. The cost is covered by cash donations and services. The library re-open date is scheduled for March 6<sup>th</sup>.

-Met with the representative from Avesta to develop a list of the items that will need to be done to accommodate a 24 unit building for elderly housing on the Young Street property.

-The Route 236 project (Berwick Road) is scheduled to begin this summer. Minimal changes to the plan are expected. Additional upcoming MDOT projects include grinding and repaving Main Street and making the sidewalks ADA accessible.

-Continuing work on the roads analysis. More information should be available for budget discussions. Both the Manager and Public Works Director agree that about \$600,000 will need to be raised annually to accomplish major portions of the work necessary to keep up with the road infrastructure. We have 70 miles of roads and should be shimming and paving at least 7 miles of road each year for a 10 year rotation.

-Will start meeting with department heads next week to review budget requests.

-Received consensus to schedule a joint workshop with Eliot and possibly Kittery to discuss regionalization on Tuesday, February 21<sup>st</sup> at 6:30pm.

### **Unfinished Business**

1. On a motion by Mr. Kareckas, seconded by Mr. Burke, it was unanimously voted to authorize the **Manager to continue researching the proper procedure for discontinuing the Emery's Bridge Road Easement.**

### **New Business**

1. On a motion by Mr. Burke, seconded by Mrs. Demetracopoulos, it was unanimously voted to renew the Solid Waste Hauler License for Oceanside Rubbish until January 31, 2013.

2. On a motion by Mr. Burke, seconded by Mrs. Demetracopoulos, it was unanimously voted to renew the Solid Waste Hauler License for Waste Management of NH until January 31, 2013.

3. The Council discussed the release deed to Susan Soule-Hinds. The tax lien and all current taxes have been paid during the redemption period.

On a motion by Mrs. Demetracopoulos, seconded by Mr. Webster, it was unanimously voted to sign the release deed to Susan Soule-Hinds (map 31, lot 129-001).

-Thanked the Manager for the detailed library construction breakdown and the notes on the **Treasurer's Warrant**.
2. Mr. Burke:  
-Wished everyone a happy Valentine's Day.

4. Mr. MacPherson:  
-Stated that he appreciates the Manager's notes on the Treasurer's Warrant; it is eye opening.  
-Made note of the recent Cheers from the Heart competition at the high school. He added that even though there is no press coverage, the event raises a considerable sum.

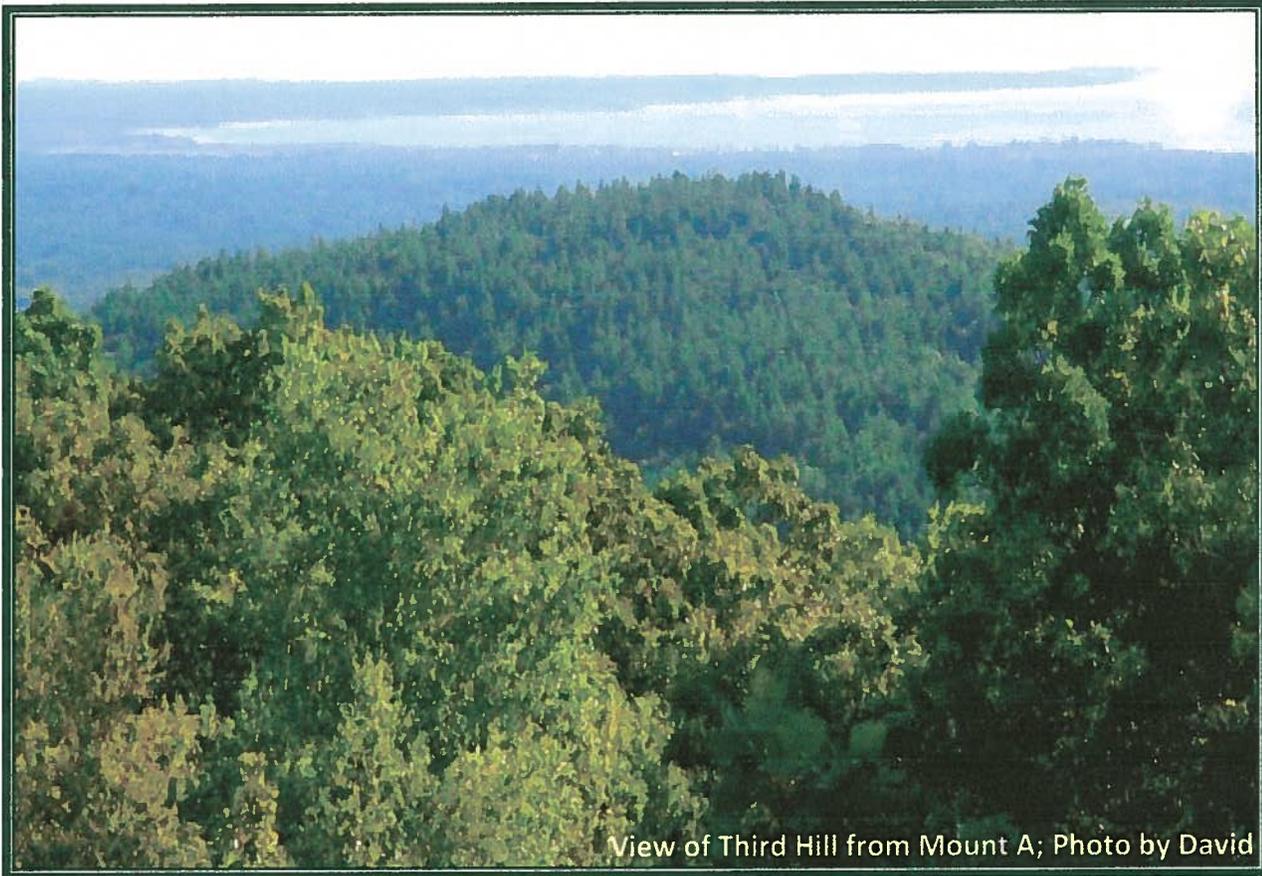

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# Mt. Agamenticus Conservation Program



## 2011 Stewardship Summary Report

Over the last twelve years conservation work at Mount Agamenticus has focused on protecting the natural resources of the area by managing recreational use, remediating trails and habitats, and educating the public. Each year, the conservation program builds on the successful work of the past with the help of seasonal trail crews and a growing number of dedicated volunteers.

The 2011 season was highlighted by the completion of three distinct hike/bike loops that encompass all three "hills" of the Mount Agamenticus conservation region, the placement of additional signage identifying "First," "Second," and "Third" hills and directional signs to the respective summits, improvements on Second & Third hill trails including the construction of a trail reroute winding to the summit of Third Hill, the placement of several tons of gravel into low areas, and both the repair and further construction of boardwalks along the major trail corridors that connect the three hills in the Mt. Agamenticus Conservation Region.

## Mount Agamenticus 2011 Season Accomplishments

The Mount Agamenticus Conservation Region contains over 10,000 acres of land and is one of the largest remaining unfragmented forests in coastal New England. The region is known for its abundant vernal pools, rich biodiversity, and unique trail system and is home to many of Maine's rare plants and animals. State, local and non-profit landowners are working together to protect this land and to balance wildlife and water quality along with sustainable recreation. These landowners make up the Mount Agamenticus Steering Committee and include: the Towns of York and South Berwick, The York Water District, Maine Dept. of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, Great Works Regional Land Trust, York Land Trust, and The Nature Conservancy.

In the spring of 2000, the conservation program began to implement the Steering Committee's Public Access and Trail Management Plan by conducting stewardship and outreach activities. A Conservation Coordinator, seasonal Conservation Crews, and project work have been funded by the Mount Agamenticus Steering Committee, granting agencies, and donations. This year, generous support came from The Rosamond Thaxter Foundation, The Maine Recreational Trails/Education Program, the Nathaniel Wheeler Trust, Norcross Wildlife Foundation, the York Conservation Commission, and private donors.

Over the years Mount Agamenticus has benefited from dedicated staff and volunteers that have worked together to remediate trails, improve trail signage, enhance visitor understanding and safety, and to align recreational activities with environmental quality. This year has been no different as the trail crew and volunteers worked tirelessly to repair poor trail conditions, increase signage identifying three distinct hike/bike loops, rerouted a trail along Third Hill, and have made many enhancements to the summit, lodge and workshop.

### Conservation Crews, Park Attendant and Internship

From late May through September 2011, a Conservation Crew worked on land owned by the Mount Agamenticus Steering Committee partners. The Crew focused on many tasks to include trail remediation, trail maintenance, trail signs, invasive plant removal, revegetation, volunteer recruitment, outreach programs and interpretive displays, summit and lodge improvements, trail assessments, GPS mapping, visitor use, soil, and habitat surveys.

Thanks to housing opportunities from the York Water District the summer Conservation Crew included members from near and far: Josh Howington from Kalispell, MT; Brock Sanborn from North Waterboro, ME; Reaha Goyetche from York, ME; and Andrew Grech from Harwinton, Ct. The crew was supervised by Roger Clements from York, ME and supported with a grant from the Recreational Trails Program with matching funds from the Town of York.

Kristina Clements from York returned for a third year as the Mount Agamenticus Park Attendant. Kristina focused on Learning Lodge operations, docent recruitment, summit landscaping, and outreach duties. This position is funded by the York Parks and Recreation Dept.

The Conservation Crew and Park Attendant were directed by the Mount Agamenticus Conservation Coordinator, Robin Kerr.

The conservation program has just completed a twelfth successful year of trail improvements, habitat restoration, and environmental education around Mount Agamenticus. Conservation activities continue to be praised by the public. This year, feedback has been overwhelmingly positive concerning the condition and availability of trails as we continue to carefully balancing water quality, wildlife and recreation.

The following is a review of the great work accomplished this year:

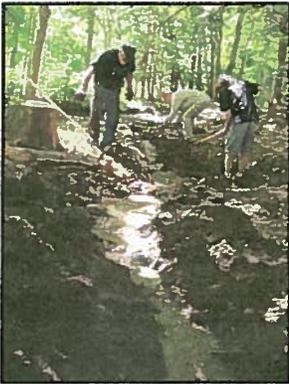
### Trail improvements:

- Built a new trail of approximately 2000' ascending to 3<sup>rd</sup> Hill.
- Rerouted 110' of trail; 70' on Notch trail and 40' on Norman Mill.
- Added signage to identify 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Hills; 6 new signs.
- Posted new signage using icons to identify three hike/bike loops totaling over 45 icons and 6 miles of trail.
- Blazed an additional two miles of trail on 2<sup>nd</sup> Hill.
- Identified all three summit hikes with summit signs and elevations.
- Recovered two large mud areas totaling 35' (Norman Mill and Notch) through material removal and surface hardening – minimum fill.
- Placed over 50 tons (6 truck loads) of rock along 7.1 miles of trail (Notch, Norman Mill and Great Marsh) to fill mud holes and harden the surface for multi-use traffic.
- Constructed 62' of new boardwalk: 50' of new multi-use boardwalk on Cedar trail and 12' of new boardwalk on 2<sup>nd</sup> Hill.
- Constructed 15' log walkway at base of 3<sup>rd</sup> Hill trail.
- Constructed 2 rock-bars and armored 10sqft area on Porcupine, below Rocky Road.
- Viewscaped 400sqft area with selective cutting to provide views towards 1<sup>st</sup> Hill when hiking trail to 2<sup>nd</sup> Hill summit.



### Trail maintenance:

- Re-armored three 10' water crossings along Notch and Wheel trails.
- Replaced fill at several locations (totals about 50' of trail) along Cedar.
  - Removed roughly 30 large trees (requiring chain saw) along all SAR and 2<sup>nd</sup> -3<sup>rd</sup> Hill trails.
  - Repaired/reset rock waterways crossing Cedar trail.
  - Cleanout and expansion of water drainage structures; water bars, dirt dips, knicks, and diversion ditches, on several trails.
  - Cleaned and repaired existing boardwalks: Tread replacement and cleaning out between/below treads and stringers, etc. (Ring x 3, Cedar x 3, Notch x 3, 2<sup>nd</sup> hill x 1)
  - Minor repairs to Interpretive Trail, and overall trail signage.
  - Removed invasive plants from between trails.



### Miscellaneous trail related work:

- Miscellaneous sign construction: Overlook, Overflow Parking, Snow Removal, etc. Approximately 20 new or remade signs – not including loop icons.
- Icon construction for three loops; 18 each of Bear, Dragonfly, and Turtle wooden signs.
- “Storywalk” stations were all replaced with permanent wooden structures for posting pages: 27 stations requiring new posts and 3sqft of platform.



- Picture posts – 5 total; constructed and posted 3 new picture posts; replaced 2 others.
- Constructed “beaver dam” for future educational site along Cedar trail.

### **Summit area improvements:**

- Replanted four garden areas: totaling approximately 200sqft.
- Painted entire north face of lodge totaling roughly 500sqft.
- Repaired lodge staircase leading to deck.
- Replaced barn door header/frame and rebuilt door. (Required removal of large nest of carpenter ants.)
- Completed office fence repairs and painting.
- All 14 picnic areas and native gardens weeded and re-mulched.
- Built and painted 15 picnic tables.
- Constructed 5 new birdhouses, and repaired 2 others.

### Work resulting from **vandalism**: (Approximately 20 hours to remediate.)

- Graffiti removal from viewing stands: 5 – 10 times this season, usually scratched into wood. (Annual)
- Graffiti removal from Summit Road: once this year.
- Sign re-installment: Along entire Cedar and Norman Mill stretch; 4 large signs and 3 smaller ones – tossed into bushes.
- Storywalk replacement of pages at 8 locations. (Happened once last year as well.)



### Work resulting from **inclement weather**: (Hurricane Irene – Aug; Snow storm – Oct)

- One full day following Irene to clean fallen debris of trails; 3 x 8hrs = 24 people hours.

Two and half days following Snow, one person = 20 people hours.

### **Volunteer efforts:**

- More than 11,400 hours of volunteer labor have been contributed since 2000!
- In 2011, local residents and community service groups worked with the trail crew to repair and maintain trails, construct and install signs, pick up trash, plant native vegetation, and remove invasive plants.
- This season, we hosted 7 community workdays along with a weekly volunteer work group. Combined, volunteers contributed more than 500 hours of time.
- Volunteers included groups from Work Opportunities Unlimited, University of New England, The New School in Kennebunk, United Way of Maine, Boy Scouts, Geocachers and the Friends of Mt. A along with individuals from neighboring communities and dedicated trail adopters. The outcome is quite an accomplishment from both a work and outreach perspective!



### **Public outreach / Education:**

- Led 9 nature walks and guided hikes including trips to all three hills.
- Hosted 14 educational programs for schools groups, scouts, and community gatherings.
- Coordinated, managed volunteer work with Lodge Docents.
- Helped set-up and man display at CFW open house.



- Continued support of several organized functions for diverse groups: Triathlon and cycling race, scouting trips, school group visits, nature walks, etc.

**Additional Learning Lodge support:**

- Continued reconditioning old ski lodge to facilitate creation of the Learning Lodge Nature Center – consisted of additional displays and exterior building repairs.
- Painted window sashes and cut window trim boards.
- Enclosed ceiling of outside lodge closet storage area.
- Finished “Giving tree” placement on south wall.
- Constructed wooden silhouettes of birds for display; 49 cutouts; painted and mounted in rafters.



Several other general tasks such as; trail box repairs, trail brushing, drainage repairs, and monitoring; litter pick-up; boardwalk tread cleaning, general mulching; volunteer workdays; tool repair/maintenance; public information sharing; soil erosion surveys; and summit maintenance such as viewing stand repairs, supplemented the significant achievements of this season.



In addition, a trial summit road gate closing/opening was conducted this season and was managed by the “Mountain Road Trail Crew”. Closing the summit road gate during night hours was very effective in preventing inappropriate activities at the summit. The overwhelming success with the gate operations should be directly attributed to the Mountain Road crew and the housing opportunity provided by the York Water District. However, some scheduling modifications will be recommended if this program continues.

Notably, the 2011 Conservation Crew was sited for an exceptional work ethic and friendliness while working with our volunteers, interacting with the public and while helping at TNC and York Parks and Recreation on coordinated projects.

This conservation work ensures that water quality and wildlife habitat continue to be protected while visitor experience, safety, and awareness are improved within a

sustainable trail network. There have been many successes to report thanks in large part to the Recreational Trails Program, the Town of York, and Mt. Agamenticus Steering Committee. It takes a lot of work to take care of this land and a fully funded trail crew is essential to our program.
